STIEF is a national consumer-focused organisation which provides medically accurate information, support, education and resources based on current international best practice, regarding the best optimal management of herpes, HPV, and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). We operate as an umbrella organisation, providing governance and project management support.

THE NEW ZEALAND HERPES FOUNDATION

The New Zealand Herpes Foundation (NZHF) was established in 1994 to provide accurate information, support, and understanding to people diagnosed with genital herpes. The foundation is a registered charity with its own Board of Trustees.



The New Zealand HPV Project is committed to improving knowledge about HPV, providing up-to-date information and non-judgmental support. The goal is to educate the public about the prevalence, transmission and management of HPV.



Just the Facts was launched in 2013 as an online resource for rangatahi. The website and Instagram provide accessible, clinically accurate information about STIs and sexual health more broadly through written and video content.

Introducing our new Clinical Lead




In January 2024 we were thrilled to welcome **Katie McCullough** to the team in the new role of Clinical Lead. Katie is a Nurse Practitioner with a special interest in sexual and reproductive health.

For a significant period of time, STIEF relied on the donated time of clinicians to ensure our resources remained accurate and up-to-date. Ultimately this was not sustainable, despite generous contributions from board members and other medical practitioners.

Thanks to bringing Katie on board, we have been able to publish new HPV and herpes clinical guidelines for the first time since 2017, as well as complete an extensive update of our patient pamphlets and websites.

Our mission is to promote optimal sexual health outcomes for all people in Aotearoa NZ.

We do this through:

- Evidence-based digital education - we provide an educational sexual health website for rangatahi (justthefacts.org.nz) & specialist websites on HPV (hpv.org.nz) and herpes (herpes.org.nz) in partnership with the New Zealand Herpes Foundation.
- Sexual health clinic database - a user-friendly tool to help people find their local clinic.
- National helplines for herpes and HPV run by nonjudgemental, expert nurse counsellors.
- Best practice clinical guidelines for the Management of Genital Herpes and the Management of Genital, Anal and Throat Infection.
- Campaigning and advocacy for improved sexual health outcomes for all peoples in Aotearoa, through partnerships with key organisations, individuals and agencies.



Consumer pamphlets

We produce eight consumer pamphlets on topics relating to HPV and herpes, including a detailed 30-page booklet for people living with herpes.

There has been a huge demand for these resources, which are sent out at no cost to anyone that requests them.

In 2024 we sent out **17,784 pamphlets**, up from 10,500 in 2023. This shows a 169% increase which follows a 200% increase from 2022 to 2023. We receive incredibly positive feedback about the content and accessibility of these resources.



Helpline

We run a helpline to allow people to speak to an experienced nurse counsellor and receive nonjudgemental information and advice. The helpline specialises in supporting people who have been diagnosed with herpes or HPV.

In 2024, 370 one-to-one counselling sessions were provided over the phone, and 170 helpline requests were responded to via email.

Clinical guidelines

Our clinical guidelines for the management of herpes and HPV are designed to support clinicians to provide best practice care. While our last editions were released in 2017, with the support of our Clinical Lead we have been able to significantly redevelop and update these to release **brand new clinical guidelines** in 2024.

Changes in the 2024 herpes clinical guidelines include:

- Guidance around second stage treatment for patients who are poorly controlled on suppressive therapy;
- Specific information on herpes proctitis;
- Recently pharmacists have been able to upskill to provide valaciclovir for episodic treatment for a recurrence of previously diagnosed HSV;
- Changes to advice on active herpes during labour;
- Commercial point of care (POC) tests available online are not supported for the diagnosis of HSV-2.

Changes in the 2024 HPV guidelines include:

- The National Cervical Screening Programme (NCSP) has changed from a cytology-based to primary HPV screening programme;
- The World Health Organization has adopted a strategy for cervical cancer elimination as a public health problem through optimal HPV vaccination and cervical screening;
- There is an increased focus on the prevention of anal cancer;
- Persistent HPV 16/18 infection has been associated with preterm birth;
- A recent review of the evidence for sexual transmission of clinical HPV in children has shown that there is no cut-off age to delineate between vertical versus horizontal transmission.

Partnerships and collaborations

New Zealand Sexual Health Society

In 2024, Olivia was part of the committee organising the New Zealand Sexual Health Conference, which was held in Ōtautahi in October. Olivia specifically supported the committee as a STIEF and Just the Facts representative to develop a youth sexual health focused stream. STIEF also had a stall at the two-day conference which was an opportunity to talk to a wide range of attendees about our resources and services.

Auckland Sexual Health Interagency Network

The Interagency Network meets approximately every three months with representatives from sexual health organisations across Tāmaki Makaurau, including Sexual Wellbeing Aotearoa, Rape Prevention Education, Burnett Foundation, and Rainbow Youth. These meetings are a great opportunity to promote resources, discuss upcoming projects, and find ways to collaborate and support shared goals.

STIEF Advisory Group

In 2023 we put together the STIEF Advisory Group, made up of a group of consumers with an interest in sexual health. This group continued in 2024 with meetings in March, June, and October. There are approximately 15 members attending each hui who provide us with insights and feedback regarding our work. This is important to us to ensure that the resources we're providing are shaped according to the needs of the consumers.

Head and Neck Cancer Foundation Aotearoa

We collaborate with the Head and Neck Cancer Foundation Aotearoa where appropriate regarding our shared goals in relation to HPV related cancers. In 2024, we jointly sent a letter to Hon Dr Shane Reti (then the Minister of Health) regarding low HPV vaccination rates in Aotearoa, and ultimately met with the Minister to share our ideas for increasing uptake. We have further plans to collaborate to promote vaccination and cervical screening in 2025.

Looking forward to 2025

2025 - 2027 strategic plan

With our in-person Board strategy day taking place in March, we'll be looking to put together a new strategic plan for the two financial years running July 2025 to June 2027. This is an opportunity for reflection and longer-term goal setting to ensure our services continue to fill an important place within the sexual health sector.

New video content

In 2025 we will be looking to create new video content for our Just the Facts social media accounts and website. We are in discussion with THETA about collaborating with them to update previous videos we have made together exploring key questions young people have about sexual health.

Social media growth

Our goal for Just the Facts in 2025 is to post consistently engaging, educational content on Instagram to grow our community of rangatahi. This will include sharing more diverse video content and looking to collaborate with other organisations and social media accounts.

HPV awareness day

Ahead of International HPV Awareness Day in March we will be looking to connect with university organisations and media to promote the HPV vaccine for university students. This will be done in collaboration with the Head and Neck Cancer Foundation.

Our commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi

Our Māori Health Policy aims to reflect the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and the Ministry of Health Whakamaua Māori Health Action Plan 2020 – 2025. This document guides how STIEF can work to address health inequities, embed anti-racism and improve Māori health. We will continue to work to ensure that our mahi is grounded in this vital policy.
